# A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

# God save the King!

All of us taking part in coronation celebrations in coming weeks will be asking God to save His Majesty the King, not least because this prayer is central to the national anthem of this United Kingdom. We know that the King is a man of faith who has a deep respect for all major world religions and those who practise them. The Christian faith, with its world-transforming good news, is central to the essence and the role of the monarch in this nation today.

We know that not all our fellow countrymen and women share a belief in God. We also know that our society is made up of people of many faiths and none. Yet the coronation causes many of us to celebrate because it is the gift of a Christian king which helps to unite the whole nation, encouraging us to be an inclusive and tolerant society. And King Charles has already done so much as Prince of Wales to speak up for a life-enhancing built environment, and for responsible ways of living which ensure a sustainable natural environment. Yet more cause to celebrate and rejoice!

### Ancient and Modern

The coronation service will reflect much of the nature of our nation and The Commonwealth today, of many of the component parts which are their very building blocks – political, civic, legal, business, community and religious dimensions. It also speaks of the deep inheritance of Christian faith which has helped to shape both monarchy and nation, stretching back to the days of the Old Testament, even before Christ himself. With the benefit of that ancient inheritance, it also looks forward to the future with the hope that comes from nothing less than the resurrection of Christ. The cross which speaks of that resurrection and hope is to be found on so much of the royal regalia with which the Archbishop of Canterbury will equip the King – sceptre, orb and crown. The Dean of Westminster will present a newly produced copy of The Holy Bible.

# **Coronation Floral Arrangements**

Thanks to the inspiring creativity and hard work of our wonderful Ripon Cathedral Flower Guild and Ripon Flower Club, the cathedral is decorated from Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> April to Thursday, 11<sup>th</sup> May with Coronation Floral Arrangements. As well as beautifying this ancient sacred space and adding to an air of celebration, these stunning flower displays speak of the different parts of the coronation service and several dimensions of monarchy, helping us to see how 'the crown' is a focus of unity and common purpose within Britain today.

Please, do make the time to come and enjoy the arrangements. And take advantage of the special booklet which explains each creation; it also includes two brief articles about the coronation service and Westminster Abbey by Canon Professor Joyce Hill.

# **Ripon Cathedral's Coronation Programme**

We at the cathedral are very keen to play our part in helping the region and diocese to come together in celebration for both Their Majesties and the life of the nation and Commonwealth. We have a full programme over the whole coronation weekend, as can be seen in the following pages.

Please, don't miss the details about the live streaming of the coronation service itself on the morning of Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May, the special Lieutenancy Service - with Ripon City Band and followed by wine and cake - on the Sunday afternoon at 3.30pm, and The Coronation Beer Festival - requiring and promoting volunteering - on the Monday. You will be very welcome to attend any or all of the services and other events.

In relation to the streaming of the coronation service itself, I have to admit to having been sceptical about our streaming of the Queen's funeral service. I thought people would prefer to be at home and being in the cathedral would make it more difficult to engage with it. I could not have been more wrong. Those of us in the cathedral, over 300 in number, stood and sat with the Abbey's congregation, sang with them and prayed with them. It was as if we had been in an ancient, sacred annex in Westminster; we had attended the funeral. I fully expect that our experience of the coronation will be equally as genuine and totally thrilling. As with the funeral, on this occasion we will have refreshments available in the South Transept during the coverage before and after the service itself.

# Prayers for the King, Queen, Nation and Commonwealth

As well as preparing for all our celebrations, we are also praying for the wellbeing of our whole nation, our new King and Queen, the Royal Family, and the Commonwealth which His Majesty serves as Head. Here is one of the prayers which we have used regularly,

Almighty God, the fountain of all goodness, bless our Sovereign Lord, King Charles, and all who are in authority under him; that they may order all things in wisdom and equity, righteousness and peace, to the honour of your name, and the good of your Church and people; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

# **Bishop of Ripon**

It was a joy and privilege to welcome the next Bishop of Ripon to the cathedral on Thursday, 27<sup>th</sup> April – the day her appointment was announced.

The Revd Canon Anna Eltringham joined chapter members for lunch in Thorpe Prepend House at the end of their morning's meeting, then visited the cathedral with them. Needless to say, photographs were taken to record this happy occasion.

Canon Anna Eltringham will swap Surrey's North Downs for the Yorkshire Dales. She grew up in the West Country and studied Business and Anthropology at the University of Durham, which sparked a love of the Northern countryside.

"Being nominated to be the next Bishop of Ripon is an honour. I am excited to serve God and his people in this place and prayerfully grow his Kingdom on earth together," she said.

"I have felt drawn back to the North of England for a number of years and have a strong sense of God's call to this particular role."

Canon Anna is married to Nigel and they have two daughters. Before entering ministry she worked in strategic marketing. Whilst increasingly involved in church, community and justice work, she discerned God's call to ordained ministry, following in the footsteps of her father and previous generations in her family.

Ordained Deacon in the Diocese of Southwark in 2008 Canon Anna served her title at Holy Innocents in South Norwood. She then joined the Oxted Team Ministry (four churches in Surrey) where since 2019 she has been Team Rector. Since 2017 she has also been the Dean of Women's Ministry, advocating for, and developing the ministry of lay and ordained women in the diocese and advising senior staff on such matters. Canon Anna has also served as an Honorary Chaplain to the Monarch since 2020.

We pray for God's blessing on Anna as she prepares for her Consecration in York Minster on Thursday, 22<sup>nd</sup> June; also for strength and resilience for her and her family as they prepare to relocate to North Yorkshire. We look forward to helping them feel

### Cathedrals Measure 2021

I have written before in the Newsletter about the Cathedrals Measure 2021. This is changing how the cathedrals of the Church of England are governed, resulting in them becoming registered charities and being regulated by both The Church Commissioners and The Charity Commission. The new measure is being rolled out across all the cathedrals in tranches over three years.

Here at Ripon Cathedral, we have had already developed many practices and structures which are consistent with the requirements of the new measure, such as being clear about the terms of reference of chapter committees, having role descriptions for committee members and volunteers, creating the Audit and Risk committee which is separate from the chapter's Finance Committee. This possibly sounds rather dull to many readers, but ensuring sound governance is essential if the mission and ministry of the cathedral is to flourish.

There are a number of areas where we will experience real differences. The measure actually had a clause which was intended only for Ripon, dissolving our PCC. We are the only cathedral to have one and this now ceases to exist, with its functions and funds being transferred to the chapter. In a way, it has always been clear that it is the chapter which has ultimate responsibility for governance, this now removes any ambiguities that existed.

# The PCC is replaced by the Growth Committee

The PCC has exercised a crucial role in coordinating the congregations' engagement in mission and ministry, and working out our cathedral vision, *Growing God's Kingdom*. For example, the work of C3 (Cathedral Community Connections) has been overseen and steered by the PCC, as have our efforts to grow the congregation and provide opportunities for Christian nurture and discipleship development. The PCC has also been the body that has enabled representatives of our congregations to discuss things, and make decisions and recommendations influencing what we do as a Christian community. All of this is still needed.

With the implementation of the new measure and the revision of our Constitution and Statutes, we are creating the Growth Committee. This will be a committee of chapter and will fulfill those vital roles which have been provided by the PCC. Its members will

still be chosen by the congregations through the system of election at the annual meeting. As with the PCC, those who are members of the electoral roll will have the opportunity to elect people at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. Under the new system, these names will then go to Chapter for formal appointment to the committee.

# The Annual Meeting - Monday, 22<sup>nd</sup> May, 7.15pm in the cathedral

There is still very much the need for an annual congregational meeting. In fact, with the cathedral enjoying so much development at the moment, there is probably more reason than ever for congregation members to hear the reports, ask questions, and choose representatives to sit on the Growth Committee.

Please, do join us on Monday, 22<sup>nd</sup> May from 7.15pm in the cathedral nave. The meeting will be followed by refreshments and an opportunity to celebrate all that God is doing amongst us and through us as we seek to grow his church and serve his world – all part of growing God's kingdom.

At the annual meeting we will also continue to elect churchwardens, approve the appointment of salespeople, and, in the relevant years, elect deanery synod representatives. Nomination forms for churchwardens and Growth Committee members are now available in the cathedral.

# The Ripon Cathedral Consultative Council

Another effect of the Cathedral Measure is that the chapter alone becomes the corporate body of the cathedral. Since the measure of 1999, the College of Canons and the Cathedral Council have joined the Cathedral Chapter in being the corporate body. Also, the council now ceases to exist.

Chapters have been given the option to create a consultative body following the dissolution of the council. We at Ripon Cathedral, valuing the contribution made by the council over the years, have decided to exercise this option. We are creating The Ripon Cathedral Consultative Council.

This consultative council will include regional stakeholders who bring senior experience from private, public and voluntary sectors, as well as from the church in the region. It will be a critical friend to the chapter and also be a means of the cathedral being informed about the life of the region. This supports our prayers for the region and helps us to shape our service for its people in ways which are appropriate and timely.

I am grateful to Canon Judith Donovan, chair of the existing council, for being willing to accept the chapter's invitation to become chair of the new consultative council. I am also grateful to all those people who have served on the council and who will be meeting for the last time in June. They are:

In addition, I am grateful to those who are accepting our invitation to serve on the consultative council. If you are a person with an association with the York and North Yorkshire Chamber of Commerce, or know someone who is who might be willing to serve on the consultative council, we are keen to hear from you.

We will publicise the full membership in the autumn when it meets for the first time.

# Ripon Cathedral Renewed – significant approval

I am delighted to report that the Ripon Cathedral Renewed project, our plans to secure desperately needed facilities for the cathedral, has been given a significant boost in recent weeks. The Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England has given approval for our plans to build an annex on the north side of the cathedral. Like Historic England, it has been working with us on the development of our plans. And, again like Historic England, it sees that the proposals will benefit not only the cathedral but also the city. Strengthening the city's economy and improving the environment around the cathedral are central priorities for us, along with meeting the cathedral's needs and strengthening its sustainability.

It is the needs of the cathedral and the city which justify all the effort and expense, and the felling of 11 trees. The latter is not something that we would have ever wished for, but the mitigation includes planting 14 trees near the cathedral and another 300 in the area; open green space and biodiversity will both increase.

We now await the meeting of the planning committee which will have the opportunity to open the way for this significant improvement for cathedral and city. Local authority restructuring has resulted in a delay for us with this; our hope is that a decision will be made before August.

Please, do keep praying for this important project and for those who are working hard to bring it to fruition.

# NEWS FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

There were so many encouraging comments made about the meaningful worship during Holy Week and Easter that it was a times overwhelming. The Choristers, Choral Scholars and Lay Clerks under the direction of Dr Krippner sang beautifully and Ester Day rounded off a good term.

The new term brings new opportunities with both boy and girl choristers singing their own Evensongs with Anthems used at the last two coronation services. The boys will also be singing at the special Evensong that sees Canon Claire Renshaw installed as a Residentiary Canon and is an important moment in the life of the Cathedral. The girls will sing the following week at the Regional Commemorative service marking the coronation. The week after sees the Boys singing Evensong at York Cathedral supporting the Minster choir. (The girls will sing Evensong later in the year at Durham).

The term ends with chorister sleepovers in the Cathedral and the singing of Matins at 8.30am on both Saturday 1 July (Girls) and Saturday 8 July (Boys).

These exciting extras are on top of a full programme of worship and rehearsals. As you can imagine this is demanding and the Music Dept is asking for a few people to help with all of this. Could you spare a little time to help us on this journey to excellence?

We are currently looking for a couple of volunteers who would be able to help walk a chorister from home to the Cathedral one or two mornings a week; we are also looking for a couple of volunteers who could help transport choristers to school after morning rehearsals at 8.20am. # AUTUMN LECTURES Dates for your diary

**On October 5<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>** Professor Joyce Hill will be presenting exciting new research on Wilfrid. The first will be on Wilfrid's three journeys to Rome, systematically examining, for the first time, the evidence for the different routes that he took. This will draw upon Professor Hill's own research, which will be published in Germany later this year.

The second lecture will be on the replacement for Wilfrid's great dedication Gospel Book which was specially commissioned by Archbishop Oswald when he rebuilt the basilica after its destruction in 948. This sumptuous tenth-century replacement has recently been identified as a manuscript now owned by the Pierpont Morgan Library in New York. **Both lectures will be in the Quire at 7.30 p.m.** 

# Pilgrimage to Iona

Following the successful cathedral pilgrimage to Rome in 2022 and the, we trust, successful pilgrimage along a part of the Camino to Santiago de Compostela, we are exploring a pilgrimage to Iona in May 2024.

Iona has an ancient Christian history, with the visit of Columba to Iona in 563, when the first monastery was founded and the rebuilding of the Abbey in 1938 by members of what became a new religious community, the *Iona Community*. The island was described by George Macleod, the Community's founder as a *'thin place, where only tissue paper separates the material world from the spiritual world'*.

Following extensive research, the option that we are planning to go with is to stay at the Abbey, the Iona Community centre on the island. Staying here means participating in community living with shared meals and some small shared tasks. Following a recent refurbishment, the Abbey offers accommodation in twin or three bedded rooms with bathroom facilities shared between two or three rooms. (There is no ensuite accommodation nor there are any dormitories). If a single bed in a shared room is not for you, then this pilgrimage to the Abbey is not appropriate.

Guests arrive att he Abbey on a Saturday afternoon leaving the following Friday have lived and worshipped in community.

It is hoped that we will stay during the May half term in 2024 so that families can be a part of the pilgrimage (25-31 May). Prices for 2024 have not yet been set but prices for 2023 are £672 per person full board with significant reductions for children under 15 and those on state benefits and asylum seekers. The only additional cost would be to get to the island which requires sailing from Oban (45 mins) and then driving or taking the service bus across Mull (75 mins) and then a final short ferry over the Sound of Iona to the island.

If you would like to find out more about the possibility of a pilgrimage to lona then please come to a short meeting on Thursday 4 May 2023 in the Cathedral at 7pm.

# ECO ACTION GROUP COFFEE & CONVERSATIONS on Earth Day, 22nd April

A good turnout of people enjoyed the coffee morning, organised by Loretta Williams and Dorothy Gray, supported by others. The aim was to promote conversations about personal actions we can take to live more sustainably as we work towards a Silver Eco Church award at the Cathedral.

As well as serving coffee and scones, there was a cake stall, a stall about biodiversity with a selection of seeds to choose and plant at home, an art stall for nature colouring, and a stall with sustainable products. A leaflet, TIPS FOR GREEN LIVING: REDUCE RECYCLE REUSE, was given to visitors and new ideas flowed, thanks to various conversations, including the one below.

# TIPS FOR GREEN LIVING: REDUCE RECYCLE REUSE A checklist from the Cathedral Eco-Action Group. Mark the box for those you do or try: 1. Avoid cling film—use washable silicone lids to cover food In fridge 2. Use waxed cloths to wrap sandwiches and pies 3. For summer picnics, if you use disposable plates, cups or cutlery, then get compostable or recyclable ones 4. Recycle 'grey' water from washing up or cleaning by using it to water your garden 5. Most disposable wipes have some plastic in them so try to use reusable and washable alternatives. If you use old cloths from expired tea towels etc this will save you money and save landfill 6. Use a washable cloth or reusable pads to remove makeup and avoid cotton wool pads 7. Use green refillable cleaning products such as Ecover or those from the Green House shop in Ripon city centre 8. Use reusable laundry balls or sheets rather than regular laundry detergent products 9. Follow 'No Mow May' to give wild flowers (for pollinators) a chance on your lawn 10. Try to use recycled and ideally unbleached toilet paper and paper kitchen towels If you have ticked all or most of them WELL DONE. And please contact the Eco-Action Group if you have additional tips and ideas for doing more to care for our planet.

**RIPON TOGETHER** has held two well attended meetings in Thorpe Prebend to share ideas for an Eco Strategy for Ripon. As well as interested individuals, representatives from the North Yorkshire Council, Ripon City Council, National Trust, The BID, Ripon Cathedral, Christian Aid, St. Wilfrid's, and The Ripon Poppy Project were keen to help.

### ECO ACTION GROUP at SIGHTS AND SOUNDS on 18th March

It was a good opportunity to promote Eco Church and explain how the Cathedral is trying to achieve Net Zero Carbon 2030.

Ripon Grammar School Year 7 pupils contributed 30 'Green Christian' leaflets about caring for God's world, which they had created as part of their Religious Studies curriculum.

# ECO ACTION GROUP EXHIBITION 13/2 - 20/3/23

Climate Emergency – A Spiritual Response ... This recent exhibition highlighted the climate crisis. It raised awareness of the need to pray for a green transition and to act for a green transition as we join the Church of England's journey to Net Zero Carbon 2030.

The exhibition included collages made by the After School Club asking us to care for the oceans and sea creatures. 150 sunflower seed packets and prayer cards were taken by visitors. Many people wrote appreciative comments about the exhibition

The congregation and visitors contributed to an interactive survey over five weeks.



Results of the 'Caring for our World' Survey.

Answers – Well: 50 (18%) OK: 77 (27%) Badly: 154 (55%)

**Conclusion:** Work to be done to raise awareness, as 45% of responses think we are caring for our world 'Well' or 'OK'

### PROTECTING NIGHT SKIES AND HELPING WILDLIFE



Hawnby in North Yorkshire is the first village England to swap its streetlights and more than 100 other outdoor lights for dark skies-friendly lighting. It wishes to cut light pollution to help nocturnal wildlife and allow residents and visitors to see the stars and planets.

The North York Moors village is located in an international dark sky reserve, one of only

21 sites in the world designated by the International Dark-Sky Association.

\*\*Perhaps we should all minimise our outdoor night lights – even solar powered lights\*\*

### APPRECIATING NATURE LOCALLY

Here are three accessible and uncrowded Nature Reserves near Ripon, in addition to the beautiful **Ripon City Wetlands** managed by Yorkshire Wildlife Trust.

**1. Stavely Nature Reserve,** Minskip Road,Boroughbridge HG5 9LQ is managed by the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust. This wetland site lying close to the river Tutt holds year-round interest with regular sightings of otters and several orchid species among the highlights.



Thornborough, on a minor road off the A6108 at West Tanfield.



This unique and important cluster of Neolithic monuments lies on a raised plateau above the river Ure. Three huge circular henges – sometimes described as the 'Stonehenge of the North' – were built here about 4,500 years ago over an earlier monument.

The earthworks are thought to have been part of a 'ritual landscape' and form part of the most important concentration of Neolithic monuments in the North of England.

3. Nosterfield Nature Reserve, Lower Ure Conservation Trust, near West Tanfield
150 acres of wet grassland and open water situated between the Rivers Ure and
Swale.









