A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

Buen Camino!

'Buen Camino!' This was the greeting we 22 Ripon Cathedral pilgrims found ourselves exchanging in late August with countless others along the same pilgrim way. We were doing the last 110 km of the Portuguese pilgrim route to Santiago de Compostela. The word camino means way and has come to refer to a pilgrim route. The greeting is a way of wishing others a good, blessed, fruitful pilgrimage. Well, we Ripon pilgrims certainly experienced that.

Walking in northern Spain, sometimes in temperatures well into the 30's centigrade, we were encouraged by the fact that many cathedral people back home were sharing in a spiritual pilgrimage with us, saying our daily prayers with us and tuning into our brief daily reflections which were broadcast on Facebook and YouTube. That, and the support, conversation, and general good company of each other, helped us to reach our goal – the ancient shrine of St. James the Great, a place of pilgrimage since the 10^{th} century.

Compostela today is a place of constant celebration, as thousands of pilgrims, the largest proportion of them young adults, arrive every day to great cheers. A cheer certainly went up when we arrived.

Our journey took us in five stages from Vigo, via overnight stops in small lodges and hotels where, mercifully, our luggage never failed to be waiting for us. For many of us, there was genuine concern that we might not be able to do the whole thing on foot. That was only important, really, if we were determined to gain a Camino certificate at the end. And that in turn required our pilgrim passports to contain at least two pilgrim stamps for each day from churches, cafes, and bars along the way.

The pilgrim passport did give us food for thought, it must be admitted. It informed us that we could qualify for the pilgrim certificate by walking at least 100km. That was fine, yes we were striving to do that. But we could also have qualified by cycling at least 200 km, by taking a boat at least 90 nautical miles, or by riding a horse for 100 km. On the Wednesday afternoon, walking a long up-hill stretch in extreme heat, I vowed I would learn to ride a horse before my next Camino.

So, the Camino was a joy – a time of wonderful encounters, deep conversations, space for reflection and prayer, and friendships deepened through sharing laughter and challenges. Aching feet and limbs were among the challenges.

Our daily prayer book informed us that Richard Rohr wrote,

'The meaning of a pilgrimage is an interior journey. Primarily, it's an interior journey enacted exteriorly. When we return home, if no interior journey has happened, we really haven't made a pilgrimage. We've just been tourists. We've travelled around and said, "I saw this, and I saw that, and I bought this," and so forth. But that's what a tourist does, not a pilgrim. And God has called us on pilgrimage.'

Well, this could be applied to so much in life, couldn't it? Human flourishing is helped by a willingness to develop spiritually and embrace the opportunity of change. Every day of life is filled with the possibilities of spiritual encounters and insight, of discerning God's close presence with us in the good times and the testing seasons. Often, it's a clear vision of what we think God is calling us to be and do, discerned afresh at different stages of life, that gives us a sense of purpose and value. In conversation with other pilgrims from all over the world, I got the clear impression that for many the motivation to walk to Santiago de Compostela is a desire to refocus on God and to discover a new direction for life.

Some of our group were very keen that we should sing. John Bunyan's famous hymn was an obvious choice. It's first verse:

He who would valiant be 'gainst all disaster, Let him in constancy follow the Master. There's no discouragement shall make him once relent, His first avowed intent to be a pilgrim.

We couldn't help but remember that while we were blessed with the opportunity to do the Camino for a week, many in the world have been facing real disasters in their lives. There have been appalling fires and storms, asylum seekers losing their lives at sea, the ongoing conflicts in Ukraine, Sudan and across Israel-Palestine. The list could go on...

A feature of the Camino de Santiago is the beautiful stone crucifixes along the way, each one reminding us that we have a God who doesn't distance himself from the pain and suffering of the world – quite the opposite.


We can only hope for people who are faced with tragedies, challenges, and big decisions in life that they can find a faith in God which gives them strength and guidance. One powerful reflection for me from the Camino is that the pilarimage of life, with its inevitable ups and downs and perplexities, is certainly helped by a living, active faith in the God who is faithful to us and who calls us individually by name. I was very encouraged by the number of young people doing the Camino who seem to have grasped that truth, and I was left longing for us to be bolder in humbly sharing that insight with people of all ages in this country. Encouraging more people to make a pilgrimage to ancient sacred places, such as Ripon Cathedral, is one way of doing this - especially for young adults, perhaps.

Pilgrims reach the shrine

Pilgrimage is a theme that we are used to pondering here at Ripon Cathedral. This has been a place of pilgrimage for centuries, going back to the mediaeval shrine of St. Wilfrid, and to his 7th century crypt. We still see large numbers of people arrive as pilgrims today, and within the cathedral itself we have several pilgrim trails on different themes, including The Rule of St. Benedict and Treasures Untold. We also have trails for children which could be regarded as pilgrimages.

I was delighted to hear great reports from a group connected with St. Cuthbert's, Pateley Bridge, who in August had done a week's pilgrimage from Bradford Cathedral to Ripon Cathedral. They were delighted by the service they had in the Chapel of the Resurrection.

We are grateful for the support we get from volunteers near and far who help us to offer hospitality to pilgrims and all visitors to Ripon Cathedral. It became ever more obvious to us doing the Camino de Santiago that a warm, generous welcome is crucially important and communicates much.

It is a credit to our volunteer guides and welcomers that for the second year running we have received a Tripadvisor Travelers' Choice Award. We are grateful to them all. And perhaps doing a stint of duty sometimes feels like something of a pilgrimage – being on one's feet for a long time, encountering new people and, sometimes, having time to ponder and reflect.

However we apply the theme of pilgrimage to our lives, the last verse of Bunyan's hymn can offer encouragement;

Since, Lord, thou dost defend us with thy Spirit, We know we at the end shall life inherit. Then fancies flee away! I'll fear not what men say, I'll labour night and day to be a pilgrim.

For each one of us in the whole of life, Buen Camino!

Here is a prayer written by Angela Ashwin that you may find helpful,

Christ our guide,
Stay with us on our pilgrimage through life;
When we falter, encourage us,
When we stumble, steady us,
And when we have fallen, pick us up.
Help us to become, step by step, more truly ourselves,
And remind us that you have travelled this way before us.
Amen.

It is always good to have the 'home team' back on duty, but we have been lucky this year with a number of excellent choirs. We had regular visitors returning with Voces Seraphorum, Rectory Chorale amongst them. We were also delighted to welcome choirs, returning after previous visits. Amongst them The Danensian Choir who returned after visits in 1976, 1980, 1986 and 1991!

Many enjoyed the visit of a newly formed choir, visiting for the first time. The Steel City Choristers made the short journey from Sheffield for their first residential over the weekend of the Ripon Wilfrid Procession. The look on the faces of the younger choristers as those from the procession filled the Cathedral were wonderful! 



AUTUMN LECTURES

Canon Professor Joyce Hill, *Travelling with Wilfrid: new research on his journeys to Rome*

An illustrated lecture on Wilfrid's three journeys to Rome, systematically examining, for the first time, the evidence for the different routes that he took and how the journeys were accomplished. This draws upon Professor Hill's own research, which will be published in Germany later this year.

Canon Professor Joyce Hill, Wilfrid's Lost Dedication Manuscript and the Survival of its Tenth Century Replacement: a re-discovery in recent times

This lecture is on the replacement for Wilfrid's great dedication Gospel Book, specially commissioned by Archbishop Oswald when he rebuilt the basilica in Ripon after its destruction in 948. This sumptuous tenth-century replacement has recently been identified as a manuscript now owned by the Pierpont Morgan Library in New York.

Both lectures will be illustrated, and both are free.

GROWING GREENER – RIPON CATHEDRAL ENVIRONMENT NEWS

ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI – FEAST DAY – WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 4TH 2023 St Francis of Assisi is the patron saint of ecology.

Francis of Assisi was born Giovanni di Pietro di Bernadonne, about 1181 and died on 3rd October 1226. His father was a wealthy silk merchant and his mother was a French noblewoman.

Francis led a privileged and riotous life until joining a military expedition against Perugia in 1202. He was captured and spent a year in prison. He became ill and began to re-evaluate his life. When he returned to Assisi in 1203, he resumed his former life but with less enjoyment. In 1205, he decided to become a knight but a strange vision made him return to Assisi.

Then he rejected worldly values and dedicated himself to God, to the poor and the suffering, and to all creatures in God's creation. He created the Franciscan Orders – The Friars Minor, The Poor Clares and the Third Order of Men and Women. He was canonised in 1228 and is one of the most venerated figures in Christianity.



The film *Brother Sun, Sister Moon* is a 1972 film

directed by Franco Zefferelli. It is an examination of the life of St Francis of Assisi.

The film reflects something of the anticapitalist counter culture of the 1970's, as well as documenting the main influences and events in the life of St. Francis.

Critics at the time were not enthusiastic but it is worth watching as an Italian interpretation of St Francis. The film is available from Amazon on DVD and from Amazon Prime to rent or to buy.

The Canticle of the Creatures Famous prayer of St Francis of Assisi

Most high, all powerful, all good Lord! All praise is Yours, all glory, all honour, and all blessing.

To You, alone, Most High, do they belong. No mortal lips are worthy to pronounce Your name.

Be praised, my Lord, through all Your creatures, especially through my lord Brother Sun, who brings the day; and You give light through him. And he is beautiful and radiant in all his splendour! Of You, Most High, he bears the likeness.

Be praised, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars; in the heavens You have made them bright, precious and beautiful.

Be praised, my Lord, through Brothers Wind and Air, and clouds and storms, and all the weather, through which You give Your creatures sustenance.

Be praised, my Lord, through Sister Water; she is very useful, and humble, and precious, and pure.

Be praised, my Lord, through Brother Fire, through whom You brighten the night. He is beautiful and cheerful, and powerful and strong.

Be praised, my Lord, through our sister Mother Earth, who feeds us and rules us, and produces various fruits with coloured flowers and herbs. (Completed in 1226 the year of St Francis' death)

THE INFLUENCE OF ST FRANCIS ON THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY AND SUSTAINABILITY CRISIS

Pope Francis, in his 2015 encyclical 'Laudato Si' ('Praise be to you'), called on people to reject consumerism and return to the values of St Francis. It coincided with the Paris Climate Agreement.

This prayer by Pope Francis appeared at the end of the encyclical.

A prayer for our earth

All powerful God, you are present in the universe and in the smallest of your creatures. You embrace with your tenderness all that exists. Pour out upon us the power of your love, that we may protect life and beauty. Fill us with your peace, that we may live as brothers and sisters, harming no one.

O God of the poor, help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this earth, so precious in your eyes. Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it, that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction. Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain at the expense of the poor and the earth. Teach us to discover the worth of each thing, to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognize that we are profoundly united with every creature as we journey towards your infinite light. We thank you for being with us each day. Encourage us, we pray, in our struggle, for justice, love and peace.

IN THE ANGLICAN CHURCH, THE FIFTH MARK OF MISSION IS 'TO STRIVE TO SAFEGUARD THE INTEGRITY OF CREATION AND SUSTAIN AND RENEW THE LIFE OF THE EARTH.'

We are living in a climate emergency. Global warming is causing wildfires on all continents, affecting humans and all other species. Droughts and floods have become more extreme, disrupting food supplies and creating homelessness. Unfortunately, the impact of climate change is felt most by poorer countries. The people living in these countries have much lower carbon footprints yet suffer much more.

Living in the UK, we are sheltered from most of these events but we are aware and saddened by the suffering of others. The personal realisation of the need to live a more sustainable lifestyle can be almost like a religious conversion. Accepting the reality that climate change has been caused by human use of stored carbon over a relatively short time span is a shock.

Then the challenge arises: How to cope with the new understanding? What to do about it?

THE LETTER – POPE FRANCIS' FILM TO EVERYONE – why not watch it on 4th October 2023?

On the feast day of St Francis in October 2022, Pope Francis released a film, THE LETTER.

It is free to watch on YouTube. It is sent by Pope Francis to every one of us. It is his message asking us to care for mother earth. It is a moving film with a simple message and gives a voice to those affected by climate change – the poor, the indigenous, the young, the scientists and the anxious. It is a film that you cannot easily forget.







In 2021 he co-chaired the Archbishops' Anti-Racism Taskforce which produced the report From Lament to Action.
